PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

I think that most balloon pilots, and most probably all competitors, will agree that we have had a very good year of ballooning competitions and that we have a nice bunch of champions. And I heartily agree. Pilots and teams, officials and organisers have made huge efforts to make our events successful and I would like to thank them all for their contributions to the sport.

The AX World Championship in Brazil and the AX Women's World Championship in Poland were successfully held and participants were mostly happy to have attended. The event organisers are to be congratulated.

The Gordon Bennett and the AX Junior World Championship in Vichy/France have met some problems but were nevertheless completed successfully. Most of the problems encountered were due to very poor communication between the Balloon Federation, the local organiser and the CIA. This issue will be discussed during the CIA Plenary meeting in March.

Having said this, I would like to mention and to thank another category of people who are huge contributors to the wellbeing of our sport: The CIA delegates. We tend to forget that it is at their level, within their home NACs and within the CIA, that most of the groundwork is laid that not only makes it possible to measure and compare excellence in competitions and records, but also to represent our activities and to defend our interests. During the year and between CIA Plenary meetings you seldom hear from our delegates, but I can assure you that some are very active and contribute a lot to the efforts to keep ballooning alive and well. Having been around for what I call "an extended period of time", I must however admit that never before have I felt more convinced that without our delegates' permanent involvement, nationally and internationally, we are risking to lose ballooning's "as yet" privileged position with potential new pilots, the public, authorities, event organisers and with the larger aviation community. It is no secret that there are many very attractive and rewarding activities around and that today we need to make extra efforts if we wish to attract new people. We need to find ways and means to show that our activities are attractive, safe and fun and therefore I am grateful that our delegates take over a major part in these efforts. As recently as on October 15 during an EASA Safety Conference in Rome, Don Cameron, a former CIA delegate, was damning in his indictment of EASA while vehemently defending ballooning's interests. He clearly captured the attention of not only the main audience but also the leading EASA players. This is a perfect example of getting involved for the benefit of ballooning.

During the FAI General Conference, held in Thailand from Oct. 14-18, I had the opportunity to listen to and discuss with many "key" FAI players and I must admit that generally optimism prevails. A discussion paper prepared for the 107th FAI GC stated that FAI is aware "of the major challenges for FAI and its stakeholders, is suggesting a clarification of the main purpose of FAI and introduces a proposed revised overall goal for FAI. It also identifies necessary FAI action to meet these challenges and suggests goals and strategies for a number of areas." The 15 pages of this discussion paper are highly recommended reading and the paper is available upon request. Maybe you will find the time to read the paper during the coming festive days and to find some inspiration on what to do to help tackle these major challenges.

Wishing you all a nice winter rest or a nice flying season, and hoping to see many of you in Lausanne.

2014 FAI GENERAL CONFERENCE

The FAI General Conference took place from October 14th to 18th at the Hotel Holiday Inn in Pattaya. World Air Games 2015

The WAG 2015, to be held in December 2015 in Dubai, plan to have an AX event and a BX event.

Initially, 30 AX pilots and 10 BX pilots are to be invited, but the CIA and the organisers are negotiating to increase the number of AX invitations to 40. The CIA Bureau has decided on the following selection process:

- Invitations will be based on the 2014 CIA AX World Ranking List, from 1st place up to the maximum number
 of invitations.
- Invitations shall be for the Individual pilots and are not NAC based.
- No NAC may have more competitors than 10% of the maximum number invited.
- Invited pilots who do not take up their invitation may be replaced by the next available pilot of the same NAC ranked below rank 100 on the CIA AX World Ranking List. If no pilot of the same NAC is available below rank 100 then the pilot may be replaced by the next available pilot below rank 100.
- No previous medal holder shall be invited.
- The host NAC has the right to nominate 1 additional competitor.

FAI Silver Medal for Alex Nagorski

At the 108th FAI General Conference in Pattaya/Thailand the FAI decided to award the FAI Silver Medal to past CIA Secretary Alex Nagorski. The citation reads as follows:

Born June 16, 1946 in Halden (Norway), Alex Nagorski has served FAI, CIA and Canadian Ballooning and the entire international ballooning community for more than 30years as one of the foremost experts in organizing, managing and assisting ballooning activities, both nationally as well as internationally.

He obtained his balloon pilot license in 1982 and continues to serve the Edmonton Balloon Club as chief pilot. During his remarkable career Alex Nagorski has participated in over 35 major national and international ballooning events in his capacity as competitor, organizer, official, and FAI Juror. From 1995 to 2006 he was the Canadian delegate or alternate-delegate to the CIA and he was elected CIA Secretary in 2005 to serve until 2014. Since 1995 he led the way in many of the CIA's ballooning projects by relentlessly working until this day as chairman or member in the CIA's Lighter Than Air Education WG, the Event Development Services, the PR and Media WG and the CIA International Jury Board.

His dedication to the world's ballooning community can be demonstrated further by his work as editor of the CIA Newsletter and in writing CIA Guidelines Manuals focusing on event organization and youth activities.

Alex Nagorski was awarded the FAI Bronze Medal in 2007 and the Paul Tissandier Diploma in 1998.

We congratulate Alex for this outstanding award.

new version of the WADA World Anti-Doping Code

Dear FAI News Readers,

The World Anti-Doping Agency approved a new version of its World Anti-Doping Code during their last Conference. This comes into force on January 1st, 2015. This required a revision of the FAI Anti-Doping Rules. The new code also gave us some extra flexibility with details in our FAI rules. After a thorough and careful review, the FAI Anti-Doping Rules have been approved by WADA and by the FAI Executive Board and will also come into force on January 1st, 2015. They can be downloaded here. The major changes in the FAI Anti-Doping Rules include the following:

- The standard sanction will be 4 years for cases involving non-specified substances. as well, the new
 Code introduces the concept of "Intentionality" of the violation. Other violations have different
 ineligibility periods. In the case of Specified Substances under some conditions, the sanction will
 range from a reprimand to a 2 years sanction as happened under 2009 Code. There is also the
 introduction of the concept of contaminated product.
- There are now 10 type of violations. The prohibited association has been added.
- Therapeutic Use Exemption: New Recognition process: 1) International Level athlete always apply to their International Federation (IF); 2) If they already have a TUE from their National Federation, the IF must recognize the TUE; and, 3) the IF may choose to extend the validity of a TUE automatically for a class of substances or for selected classes of substances.
- Whereabouts/Out-Of-Competition Tests: IFs may decide (based on their Test Distribution Plan), to have different tiers of Testing Pools. IFs may have an RTP as before (with athletes providing whereabouts every day, and also subject to eventual sanctions) and/or have Testing Pools (with athletes providing only general information ex: address of home and training, telephone number etc.) The Athletes in the Testing Pool are not subject to sanction IF they are not available for a random test. In the past months, the FAI has continuously voiced the option that it needs to be able to determine how best to deploy its scarce resources to detect and deter substance abuse and this will now be accommodated thanks to the update of the WADA Rules. The FAI has adopted the second option and moved away from the need to have a Registered Testing Pool (RTP).

Airship speed measuring accuracy

Every year, FAI office receive questions about record setting procedures from interested persons all over the world. Questions about balloon and airship records are sent by FAI to the CIA Records Subcommittee. Here is an example of the answer to such a question received in 2014. The question was about the measuring instruments and procedure for measuring the speed of an airship.

Airship speed measuring accuracy

Unlike some Air Sport Commissions, the CIA does not have a list of approved instruments or procedures for measuring during record attempts.

We do not have the capacity to examine all possible measuring equipment and we do no want to prevent pilots from using new or untested equipment or procedures.

Instead we look at the achieved result and the claimant must show that the requirements on accuracy and other limitations are fulfilled.

An airship speed record must be at least 3% better than the previous record in the same class and size. (SC1-4.6) The overall accuracy of a speed record must, if possible, be better than ±1%. (SC1-4.7.3.1) if not, the rules in 4.7.3.2 apply. The requirements on the course and the flight are found in chapter 4.8.6. Note that height is measured from the ground and altitude is measured from MSL (Mean Sea Level). Height and altitude can be logged by GPS.

Notes on GPS accuracy.

The accuracy of a normal commercial GPS like Garmin 76 or newer can be misleading. The GPS will show a figure relating to the accuracy and called CEP, PDP or something else. This is the 50% Circular Error Probable, a military term used in artillery. It means that the probability for an accuracy better than shown is 50%. But it also means that there is a 50% probability that the error is greater than shown.

The commonly accepted accuracy of a GPS position is, with 95% probability about ±15 meters. This is not good enough to measure a 1 km distance. There will be a 15 m error at both ends, probably not in the same or opposite directions. The 95% error will be the square root of the sum of the square of the both errors which is ±21 meters, over 2% error in the distance alone.

But there is a way to make the GPS more accurate. The answer is SBAS (Satellite Based Augmentation System). A small number of satellites send out signals, correcting the timing and making corrections for actual atmospheric conditions. With this system, the GPS error is reduced to better than ±5 meters.

Most Garmin GPS can be set to receive these signals. Just set it to WAAS enabled in the set-up page. WAAS is the SBAS system in North America and means Wide Area Augmentation System. The European equivalent is EGNOS. There are similar satellite networks in Japan for east Asia and in India for south Asia. They are all compatible so if your GPS is set to WAAS enabled, it will work on all these networks. The position display of the GPS will change from GPS to DGPS.

Now the 1 km course can be measured with an accuracy of $SQRT(5^2 + 5^2) = \pm 7$ So how about the speed measuring accuracy?

It depends both on distance measuring accuracy and timing accuracy. It even depend upon the time used during the flight over the course but it is easy to calculate for different speeds.

V is speed, S is distance and t is time on the course. ΔV is speed error, ΔS is distance error and Δt is timing error.

 $\Delta V/V$ must be less than 1% (0.01) V=S/t $\Delta V/V=\Delta S/S+\Delta t/t$

In other words:

Error in t, Δ t, is: Δ t = t{ Δ V/V - Δ S/S} We know that Δ V/V is 0.01 (1%) and Δ S/S is 0.007

So if the flight time over the 1 km course is 60 seconds (60 km/h) the timing error must be less than:

60 (0.01-0.007) = 0.18

If flight time is 90 seconds (40 km/h), the timing error can be 0.27 seconds.

If flight time is 120 seconds (30 km/h), the timing error can be 0.36 seconds.

Note

This is total timing error. There is a timing error at both ends adding up like the Square Root of the sums of the both errors, squared.

We get the following table:

Speed	60 km/h	40 km/h	30 km/h
Time	60s	90s	120s
Timing accuracy required	0.12s	0.19s	0.25s

If the 1 km course can be measured by a surveyor or by other means with an accuracy better than ±1meter, then there is much more margin for timing accuracy:

Speed	60 km/h	40 km/h	30 km/h
Time	60s	90s	120s
Timing accuracy required	0.36s	0.55s	0.73s

Final note

Flytec instruments seems to be popular to use. I do not know if they can be set to receive SBAS signals. Diagrams produced by Flytec instruments are, in general, useless for record evaluation. A printed log from a Garmin GPS with times, positions and altitudes are much better but should be in text format or as Excel files, not PDF.

Maybe Flytec can also produce such files but Flytec diagrams normally have too low resolution to be of any use.

LITTLE TOWN, BIG HEART, GREAT FLYING

Canowindra, 300 km west of Sydney, NSW has long been known as "The Balloon Capital of Australia" due to its wonderful, stable weather conditions and superb road network, making balloon retrieval easy. It is the historic home of modern sport ballooning with the first balloons flown here in the 1970's. Over the years many balloon fiestas have brought this small rural community of 2000 people to life.

A small band of local balloonists hatched a vision that would stamp Canowindra onto the world ballooning stage to host an annual world class balloon competition

Starting in 2011 the Australian National Championships have been held 3 times and finally in 2014 the dream of an International event came to fruition, supported by the local Council and State Government via Destination NSW. With notable Directors. Les Purfield (2011) David Levin (2012/2013) and now Garry Lockyer (2014 and again next year 2015) we have had interesting, challenging competition tasks and great leadership, with a team of Australian Officials honing their skills. In typical Aussie fashion 2014 opened with a cook your own barbeque for officials, pilots, crew and organising committee.

Down to business and over the following 4 days 15 tasks were flown including Garry's novel FIN, "hole in one" where the pilots had to try and drop a marker into a nominated hole on the local golf course...a fabulous crowd pleaser in the late afternoon sun.

For the first time each pilot carried a smart tracker device which showed up on a smart phone app. The public and officials could follow the balloons (each identified with an image of the balloon and pilot number, in real time. It proved a winner!!

The overall competition had Matt Scaiffe from Australia winning. A highlight was that 2 pilots, who went on to win a World and Women's World Championships in 2014 coming in 3rd (Yudai Fujita, and 5th (Nicola Scaiffe).

In 2015 we will expand the International component with the introduction of a \$20000 prize pool and \$3000 key grab
